AWARDS EVENING



On Wednesday 9 November, we held our Annual Awards Ceremony to celebrate the sporting, academic, musical and civic achievement of over 200 students in the previous academic year. Students' families joined staff and Governors for the event. We were delighted to welcome our alum Rebecca Banovic as our guest of honour.

Rebecca now works for Sky News and has been identified as one of the industry's rising stars. She has interviewed Prime Ministers, US Presidents (including Barack Obama) and worked alongside Jeff Bezos, former President and CEO of Amazon. Rebecca also works with leading charities to ensure a fairer and more equal society.

Students were inspired by Rebecca's speech. They said her experience at Drayton Manor resonated with them and they learned how resilient Rebecca was when she worked hard to achieve her dream of becoming a journalist. The Head Boy Abubakr and Head Girl Harnoor presided over the ceremony. It was lovely to welcome back students who left in the summer and who are now at university.

BBC: SHARE YOUR STORY

We were delighted to be invited to take part in the BBC's education project 'Share Your Story' to inspire young people across the nation to realise their ambitions. On Tuesday

29 November, we welcomed award-winning broadcaster, writer, and adventurer Ben Fogle to share his stories with our Year 8 to 11 students.



Ben's stories are motivating and relatable. He told students how he was able to survive in extreme conditions, and how he realised his ambitions of reaching the top of Mount Everest and rowing across the Atlantic. He is a writer and has published nine bestselling books and spoke about his personal journey with dyslexia. He encouraged students to stay curious, work hard to build the skills they need for their ambitions, learn from their setbacks, and be sure to enjoy moments of happiness as they work towards dreams and goals.



Ben's message to students resonates with Drayton Manor's school motto 'Nec Aspera Terrent – Hardships do not deter us'. Representatives from our student leadership team - Abubakr (13.8), Harnoor (13.5), Thaleise (13.8), Frankie (11I), Siham (11G), Eva (8J) and Tristan (8I) joined Ben for a discussion about his travel experiences around the world and motivation as well as his life philosophy.

Students said they were inspired and impressed by Ben's adventurous stories. They asked interesting questions about Ben's adventure and how he had overcome his challenges in studies and in everyday life. CAREERS

The Brilliant Club



40 Year 10 and Year 12 students are attending a four-month programme with The Brilliant Club to prepare for applications to leading universities and colleges. Since the start of November, students have attended five weekly tutorial sessions at the school conducted by PhD tutors in various subjects like literature, psychology, and history. The sessions challenged students' critical thinking skills. On Wednesday 7 November, students visited City, University of London. They toured the campus, attended a taster session in critical thinking, met some current students from the university and asked questions about university applications and student life. After attending the tutorials, students will complete their own project, and meet with

tutors for feedback. Students who complete the programme will receive a certificate. Two pieces of work by students could be featured in the Brilliant Club magazine – a boost to their university applications!

University of Bath Trip



Before the mock exams, all Year 11 students visited the University of Bath on Wednesday 16 November and Thursday 24 November, to inspire them to apply to study at our leading universities. Students toured the campus, attended lectures in psychology and maths, and met current students, who were happy to answer questions about university life.

Oxbridge Preparation for Year 13

This year, 11 Year 13 students have been invited to attend admission tests and interviews with the University of Oxford, University of Cambridge, Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Schools. To help them achieve their dream, we organised a series of intense preparatory sessions, including mock tests and one-on-one interview tutorials from current students from Oxbridge. Students received personal feedback from their tutors on their test and interviews so that they can improve. They will know the results by end of January. We wish them every success with their applications and their A Level studies.

Careers Talk and Drop-In





In addition to trips and bespoke tutorials, we organise careers talks from the King's College London and the Durham University to provide student with latest information about study and careers. The talk by King's College London provided insights for Year 11 and 12 students who are interested in careers in dentistry. Durham University organised a careers talk and drop-in session for Sixth Form students at Drayton Manor. Students learned about the university, the admission criteria, and application process.



MFL STUDENT EXCHANGE PROGRAMME



The school is launching a new exchange programme for students to study at a school in Germany! On 10 and 11 November, MFL teachers Mrs Hakkinen and Ms Greenwood visited Gymnasium an der Gartenstraße in Mönchengladbach, Germany, as part of Drayton Manor's new exchange partnership with the German school. Gymnasium an der Gartenstraße is a grammar school near Düsseldorf with a focus on ambition in languages and how languages can create global citizens with excellent character. Mrs Hakkinen and Ms Greenwood had the opportunity to observe German and English lessons and meet lots of students and their teachers. They also gave a presentation and answered questions about Drayton Manor. We hope this will be the start of a long and enriching partnership, with German students visiting Drayon Manor in January, and a reciprocal visit to Germany in the works for later this year for Key Stage 4. Students from

Germany and our Drayton Manor students exchanged letters and videos last year, and will take part in a project together, supported by UK-German Connection.

SPARX MATHS HOMEWORK PLATFORM

This year has marked the launch of an exciting new homework platform for Maths – 'Sparx'! Sparx uses artificial intelligence to create individual homework for all students. It offers the opportunity for students to challenge themselves as well as gain additional support. On the platform, students can earn XP points, 'Sparx Points,' which has certainly led to some healthy competition among students. We encourage students to work for their best, so we introduced a Sparx Leaderboard. Students who receive the most points in the previous week's Maths homework will be listed on the board. The board has sparked some real excitement within the Maths department.

Well done to these students who have earned the most XP points so far – **Ralph (7F), Iqra (7H), Alicja (8G), Rhihan (8E), Tamara (9E), Muhammad (9L), Zuzanna (10J), Rihanna (10L), Ming Tak (11K) and Francesca (11K)**. The students with the most XP points will be awarded every week with House merits. They will also be nominated for the Spirit of Endeavour or Ethic of Excellence awards in each term.

SPEAK OUT CHALLENGE



We recently had the privilege of hosting two sessions with the Speakers Trust organisation that run the Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge. 60 students from Year 10 had the opportunity to improve their public speaking skills, learning to express themselves and their opinions on a range of topics. Each session ended with students delivering a short speech on a topic that was important to them. The quality of the speeches was outstanding, with a wide range of topics covered. Seven students - **Concienne (10H), Lilly (10G), Esma**

(10L), Daisy (10L), Oluwakiibati (10F), Sara (10G) and Kiara (10F) have been chosen to take part in the next phase. They will deliver their speeches to the entire year group in a special assembly.

From there, the standout performer will go on to represent the school at the regional finals. We look forward to their performance.

BUILDING HS2 TUNNEL



Year 7 students attended a STEM Day on Thursday 10 November. They learned about the HS2 project, the UK's brand-new high-speed trains running between London and Birmingham. Through the day, students became engineers, learning about building tunnels for trains!

Kaan (7I) enjoyed learning how the high-speed train worked and how the structure of tunnels held up additional weight. With the support of an engineer from HS2, he worked with four teammates to create their tunnels out of straws and masking tape. The challenge was to build a tunnel as light as possible that would support the train inside and bear weight on top. They had just 40 minutes to complete the challenge, which took a lot of effort and determination. At the end, representatives of each group presented their work to the engineer for examination. Each tunnel was weighed (averaging 40 grams) then tested to see if the train could fit through while the weight was on top of it. Kaan found the tunnel building task quite challenging. He was glad to meet students from other tutor groups and it was fun to work on the tunnel challenge with them. Our Sixth Formers created a STEM HUB Autumn newsletter. Boys' Basketball



The Junior and Senior Boys' basketball clubs have seen remarkably high numbers each week since the start of the season. Year 7 training has been well attended and the work ethic of the players has seen improvements in terms of skill level and game understanding. The teams have shown excellent commitment in training, and both are currently undefeated in their league competitions. Two Girls Basketball teams competed in the Key Stage 4 Girls Basketball Tournament this term after they attended three intensive training sessions by Ms Paine after school. Well done to our A team for winning second place overall.

Netball



All netball teams have been training every Tuesday throughout this season. The Year 7 team have been training hard every week and look forward to their first match against Twyford before the term break. The Year 8 team narrowly lost to their opponent in their opening League match of the season, but they hope to bounce back with a win in their second match. The Year 9 team are looking to retain their League title and opened their campaign this season with a 10-5 win. The Year 10 team started strong this season with two straight wins in the League competition against William Perkin and Cardinal Wiseman. They took second place in the Borough Tournament, narrowly losing to the opponent in the final. The Senior team were semi-finalists in the Borough Tournament and are currently undefeated in the League competition. The Netball Club will continue through the Spring Term with League fixtures for all teams including Year 7, 8 and 9 Borough Tournaments.

Girls' Football

The club has been well attended throughout this term, with all students training with great energy and a desire to improve. The Under 13 team had an incredible run in the 7-a-side Borough Tournament. They were undefeated throughout the competition and



took home the gold medals. The Under 14 team has had a positive run in the Borough Cup competition, winning their first and second round matches by large margins. They are through to the semi-finals which will be played in January 2023. Their first League match will be played in the new year against Ealing Fields.



The Under 15 team had a dominant performance against their opponent in the first round of the Middlesex Cup. They will face Cardinal Wiseman in the next round. Good luck!

Boys' Football

Before the October half term break, 100 students attended Year 7 to 10 training at the Games Field. This was the highest number of attendances in any recent season. Despite a valiant effort, the Year 7 team lost their first Cup match of the season against Elthorne Park in the Borough Cup before the Christmas break. They will have League matches to look forward to in the New Year. All teams have matches in the New Year in both Borough Cup and League competitions. So many students have attended Sixth Form Football Enrichment this year that the school has been able to field 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th XI teams for the second time in recent years.

For the first time in several years, Drayton Manor has entered rugby teams into competition. The Year 9 boys team took part in tournaments hosted by Grasshoppers RFU and Trailfinders RFU.

Trampoline Club is extremely popular this year, with spaces filling up quickly each week. Students have worked on developing isolated skills, which they have incorporated
