Junior Maths Challenge

At the end of April, Year 7 and 8 students sat the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge (JMC) 2021. Out of a total 100 students that participated in the challenge, 61 students received an award from the UKMT. If a student achieved a Bronze award they are within the top 40% of participants in the country, Silver award within the top 20% and achieving a Gold award means they are within the top 7%! A fantastic achievement. As a result of their fantastic score in the Junior Maths Challenge a few students have gained automatic access to a national followup round. Congratulations go to Rayan (7I), Mikyle (7K), Parisa (7K), Aliya (8I), Leo (8I), Antonina (8J) and Sami (8K) for qualifying for the Junior Kangaroo. A huge thank you to all students that took part and to the Maths Department for helping run the event.

Bake sale

We continue to be very proud of the contributions that our Sixth Form

students make to the school and community. Recently our Year 12 students ran a cake sale for two different charities - Wings of Hope and Young Ealing Foundation.

Wings of Hope is a London-based charity, providing education and support for underprivileged children around the world. The Young Ealing Foundation brings together the public, private and voluntary sectors in Ealing to effect positive change in young people. The event took place in the Dining Hall and a sumptuous array of cakes was on offer including donuts, cakes slices and pastries which raised approximately £150 for the charities. Unfortunately, because of Covid restrictions the sale was restricted to Sixth Formers only but we hope it won't be long until such charity events can be shared right across the school.

Following on from the cake sale some of our Year 12 students hosted an online event in which they shared knowledge about difference cultures and traditions around the world, with the ultimate aim being to spread awareness about the importance of all children having access to free education.

Academic Writing

Year 12 students recently participated in "The Bridge", an academic writing workshop provided by the Royal Literary Fund (RLF). The Bridge is an initiative, created and delivered by professional writers, that enhances the academic writing skills of Years 12. The session covered dissecting an essay title, creating and developing an argument, and structuring paragraphs and essays.
