UNIVERSITY TRIPS FOR YEAR 12 AND YEAR 10

During the half term, we organised three trips for students to visit some top-tier colleges and universities in the country, including the University of Oxford, the University of Cambridge and Royal Holloway (University of London). It was the first time we have organised trips to universities since the pandemic.

Year 12

Year 12 students will start their UCAS applications shortly. For some study programmes such as Medicine, Dentistry or

Oxbridge, students will have to kick start their applications earlier than other study programmes. To better prepare our students with their applications, we organised two trips for Year 12 students to visit the University of Oxford and Royal Holloway, University of London.



Our students visited the University of Oxford for a day on Tuesday 10 May and had a lovely tour of St John's College led by staff and students at the university. Students asked questions about the application processes and their subject choice. They also gained first-hand experience of student life when they attended a tutorial session for a critical thinking course and enjoyed lunch in the dining hall.

During the half day tour at Royal Holloway, our students learned about the application process such as writing outstanding personal statements and making subject choices. Students also joined a workshop organised by current undergraduate students about learning life skills to prepare for living in student halls and managing their finances. Students were pleased they attended university trips as they were very helpful. They could explore a range of study options at an early stage and make informed choices about their studies and careers.



STEM DAY FOR YEAR 7



Explore the fun of doing Science experiments! As a part of the school's Careers Education, the Science Faculty hosted a STEM Day for Year 7 students on Friday 22 April. Students were asked to complete an iodine clock experiment. Working in groups, they had to find the right amount of potassium iodine solution and water so that the mixed solution would change its colour within exactly 60 seconds. It was very exciting! Ameya and Alicja (7G) said the experiment was interesting and it built up their investigative skills. 'We mixed solution A, which stayed the same with each test run with solution B, which had our independent variable – water and potassium in. After conducting several tests, we found 35ml of water and 65ml of iodine solution are the exact amount of solution B that changed the colour in precisely 60 seconds!'

WOMEN IN STEM







Thanks to our wonderful Year 12 students for establishing our Women in STEM club for Year 7 and 8 students.

Beth (12.4) and Tiyonne (12.8) created the club as they wanted to build a supportive environment for girls to gain confidence in studying STEM subjects and make friends. Beth explained. 'I questioned whether I was capable when selecting Physics for my A level. We hope the club will make a difference to the number of students signing up to do STEM subjects at A level and contributing to science nationally and internationally!'

Students have great feedback for the club. *Minnie* (71) said 'I wasn't sure if the club would just feel like doing lessons in my free time. I signed up anyway, and I am so glad that I did. It's super fun. I would recommend the club!' *Bethany* (71) said 'The club has not only been enjoyed by all but has also allowed us to look at STEM subjects in a different way.'

GREEN STEM COMPETITION



In early May, Drayton Manor STEM Hub members from Year 12 took part in the final stage of the interschool Green STEM competition organised by Imperial College London. The competition has taken place over several rounds and over five months. Beth (12.4) and Dilvir (12.8) took part in the competition. They teamed up with students from two high schools and were tasked with researching an innovative approach to improve green living across the UK. They completed a project report and presented their research findings to a panel of scientists from the Imperial University. Beth and Dilvir think the competition helped them to develop essential skills such as teamwork, project management and

Beth (12.4) said 'Our team proposed to use endophytic tablets, which are biodegradable tablets filled with useful bacteria, to increase nutrient levels in soil in areas suffering from drought, which causes nutrient deficiency. It was a very rewarding experience when we presented our ideas to scientists from a world leading university and answer their questions. Our team worked together to think on our

Early this year, the U18 Football Team won their first trophy in a three-team tournament against Cardinal Wiseman and Greenford. Team captain *Daniel* (13.2) ascribed the win to impressive perseverance and determination of the team. He wrote about the team's efforts in the competition.

'The team shocked Greenford in the first game with our quick passing, clinical finishing and strong defense, which led us to a confident

3-1 victory with two goals from *Malik* (13.1) and one goal from *Mostafa* (12.7). The second fixture in the afternoon saw Greenford, clearly frustrated by their loss to us, surprise Cardinal Wiseman with fast-paced attacks and high pressing. The win put Drayton Manor at the top of the league table by three points, making us the inaugural winners of the Paine/Patel Shield. Moreover, this was the first trophy won by the school U18 Football Team in seven years. We are very proud of that.'
