## World War One Battlefield Trip

It was a fantastic opportunity for them to apply their quantitative and qualitative skills through various field methods, working as part of a small team, and collecting their primary data while standing in the river.

Wednesday 13 July saw the return of the first annual Arts Summer Showcase since 2019. It was absolutely worth the wait...bigger, better and more exciting than ever before! In the Piazza, our audience were treated to four sets of performances, including the Year 8 SHINE choir singing "True Colours" in vocal and sign language, the school Orchestra's engaging performance of music from "How to Train your Dragon", our Year 8 Band playing "The Club" and bringing the audience to their feet and a finale performance of "Signed, Sealed, Delivered" that had over 100 students singing and playing.



In between music performances, street food was available, including the DT Department's 'Popcorn in Pop Art' which showcased Key Stage 3 textiles students' work as popcorn cones. There were also crafting stations where guests could make a festival-style headband or receive festival glitter make up.



Meanwhile, in the Sir Montague Sharp building, event attendees were treated to more music on the Gallery stage from a range of talented solo students, whilst viewing the impressive talents of our GCSE and A Level artists. The exhibition had a breath-taking range of work, from experimental textile wall hangings and expressive large scale oil paints to translucent photographic installations exploring identity and lighting.



The Key Stage 3 exhibition was also a hit, with energetic Hundertwasser inspired paintings pitched against a sea of 240 Year 7 repeat patterns. Year 9 comic strips also made a narrative contribution with pop art style onomatopoeia adding to the energy. - · All vinyl floors to be machine cleaned


## CAREERS OPPORTUNITIES AND WORKSHOPS

Before the end of school term, we organised a range of informative Careers workshops and experiential activities to prepare Year 10 and 12 students to make decisions for their future.

Year 8 - National Careers Challenge Hermione (8F), Olly (8F), Bruno (8F) and Ahmed (8G) represented the school by attending the National Careers Challenge held at The ICC Birmingham. The group took part in the Thorpe Park Challenge. They were tasked to design a brand-new attraction where the queue line is an integral part of the ride experience, and present their ideas in a Dragon's Den style event. The students gave an excellent presentation covering design, branding and promotional ideas.

Despite their effort, the team was not selected for the next round of the competition but they did an excellent job regardless. Well done to these students for giving their best efforts and keep up the good work!

## Year 10 - King's College London Medical Activity Day



On Monday 6 and Tuesday 7 June, 30 students took part in interactive workshops led by undergraduate students from the King's College London, to gain insight into studying medicine. Students learned the basics of cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), using blood pressure monitors and a blood draw. It was an engaging and insightful experience for students as they could ask questions about the study of medicine as well as undergraduate life.

## The British Army 'Elite Skills Academy'



On Thursday 9 June, Year 10 students attended a full-day of skills-based activities on site led by the British Army. Students worked in groups applying their teamwork, time management, problem-solving and communication skills. Students found the opportunity challenging yet extremely helpful and stated that they would like to attend more of these workshops in the future. The Hamilton Olympiad is a follow-on round from the Intermediate Maths Challenge and only 600 students nationally are invited to take part each year. The 2022 thresholds were a score of 13+ for a Merit and 28+ for a Distinction.

# OTHER HOUSE NEWS Ealing Soup Kitchen and Food Bank Visits



As demonstrated in Drayton Manor's value of Civic Virtue, we aim to be a positive and supportive force in the local community.

This year our House Captains have been involved in community outreach by forging links with local charities. Our House Captains visited the Soup Kitchen and Food Bank in Ealing, to meet volunteers there, and to see how these charities operate.
