

KA: Absolutely, there's a deep connection between public perception and media. At The Observer, which broadly supported Tony Blair, I learned the importance of not taking a singular viewpoint. Reflecting, it's crucial to consider multiple perspectives to avoid bias in public perception. I'm impressed with your generation's critical thinking skills. You have vast information at your fingertips. My advice is to seek diverse sources of information to navigate the world more effectively.

Q: Can you share a memorable story or

moment from your journalism career that has left a lasting impression on you?

KA: One memory I cherish is helping to overturn a miscarriage of justice. I led the investigative journalism that proved someone's innocence, which was incredibly fulfilling. Journalism isn't just about reporting news; it's about amplifying the voices of those in need and making a real difference.

Q: What advice would you give to aspiring journalists and young individuals interested in pursuing a career in journalism?

KA: I encourage you to pursue journalism—

Q: How does this victory inspire you to set new goals for yourselves and your team moving forward?


MIKEL: This victory has boosted us academically and physically, opening new doors and bigger goals.








CELEBRATING MENTAL HEALTH
