TRIP TO POMPEII



From 2 February to 5 February the Classics department led a hugely successful trip to the Bay of Naples. Latin GCSE students from Years 10 and 11 experienced a unique blend of modern and ancient life, bringing their studies of the ancient world to life in front of their eyes.



Students visited the ancient towns of Pompeii and Herculaneum where they were able to walk the streets just as the Romans did before the eruption of Vesuvius in 79CE, and even witnessed current excavations continuing in the site uncovering new buildings and remains. A particular highlight was the arrival at the house of Lucius Caecilius Lucundus (Caecilius), whom the students have studied since Year 7! From ovens in Oplontis to the theatre at Pompeii the ancient sites offered a unique opportunity to experience the real lives of everyday Romans firsthand.



As the sun breached through the clouds students ascended to the summit of Mount Vesuvius, which looms over the bay of Naples and is visible from all around. To stand on the top of the volcano which obliterated, though perfectly preserved, the towns of Pompeii and Herculaneum was an awe-inspiring moment. Students also got a taste of modern Italian life, which continues alongside these two-thousand year-old sites. A visit to a long-established gelateria in Naples gave students the opportunity to hear from a true expert about the complex and delicious process of making gelato. A team effort of ingredient measuring, pouring into machines, and serving to the group resulted in some excellently fresh gelato for all. The tastes did not stop there, as students were treated to an evening meal in a pizzeria in the heart of Sorrento. As the bay of Naples is widely considered to be 'the birthplace of pizza' this did not disappoint.

Throughout our time in Italy students showed a curiosity in the context of each site, and there was palpable excitement

at each new site. Our guide in Pompeii described the students as 'great listeners and always respectful', and they asked insightful questions at every turn. They were a credit to the school and returned to Drayton Manor with a deeper understanding and appreciation for the ancient world.



HOUSE TIMETABLES CHALLENGE

On Friday 6 February, the school hosted the much-anticipated House Times Table Challenge: Beat the Sixth Former! Our Student Wellbeing Ambassadors played a central role in shaping the week. Meeting regularly in the lead-up to the event, they brainstormed activities that were not only meaningful but also engaging and fun for their peers. Their ideas, combined with the generosity of staff volunteers, resulted in one of our most successful Mental Health Weeks yet.

A Week of Enriching Activities

Throughout the week, students had the opportunity to take part in a wide range of activities aimed at promoting wellbeing, connection and creativity. Staff volunteers kindly offered their time and expertise to run sessions including:

- Yoga
- A dodgeball tournament
- Student karaoke
- Daily morning mindfulness led by Inclusion staff



Each lunchtime, the main hall was transformed into a creative wellbeing hub, with drop-in activities such as:

- A scavenger hunt
- Mindful colouring
- Design-your-own keyrings
- Creating Thank You cards

These sessions proved extremely popular, with students sharing overwhelmingly positive feedback about the chance to unwind, be creative and spend time with friends.



Special Guests and Community Partnerships

On Tuesday, we were delighted to welcome Eleanor from NHS Mental Health Support Team and Evie from The Proper Project. Both visitors delivered interactive wellbeing activities and spoke about the mental health support available to young people in the local community. Their involvement helped students better understand how to seek help and access services beyond school.

Whole-Week Initiatives

Three initiatives ran across the entire week, giving students ongoing opportunities to reflect on kindness, community and the theme of belonging:

An art competition titled 'This Is My Place'

Kindness Bingo, encouraging daily acts of kindness
'Proud of You' tickets, which staff handed out to recognise moments of kindness, determination and positive contributions
These activities helped reinforce everyday wellbeing habits and encouraged students to notice the strengths in themselves and others.

Their confident delivery and thoughtful guidance were warmly received by pupils and staff, strengthening our partnership with the local primary community and giving our students a valuable leadership experience.

YEAR 10 BRILLIANT CLUB SCHOLARS PROGRAMME

them the chance to experience university style learning through small group tutorials led by a PhD tutor. Students were chosen for their potential to progress to highly selective universities in the future.



EXCEPTIONAL RESULTS IN INTERMEDIATE MATHS CHALLENGE

Students across Years 9 to 11 have achieved outstanding results showing exceptional mathematical ability in this year's UK Mathematics Trust (UKMT) Intermediate Maths Challenge.

14 students achieved Gold Awards, placing them among the top performers nationally. 45 students secured Silver Awards, 48 students earned Bronze Awards, and a further 73 students were recognised with Participation Certificates, reflecting both excellence and broad engagement across the school.

An outstanding 107 certificates out of 180 students who took part.

These results highlight the depth of mathematical talent at Drayton Manor. The Mathematics Department is immensely proud of all students who participated and looks forward to building on this success in future competitions.

We will get the certificates printed and celebrate our students in assembly and also send a notice to bulletins in due course.

YEAR 8 MATHS SCHOLLARS

Year 8 Maths Scholars have been exploring the creative side of mathematics by producing digital mathematical art and music using Polypad. Alongside this, they have been developing their problem-solving and reasoning skills through linear programming, with a particular focus on optimisation problems and real-world decision making. In the next term we will be working on Cryptography & Ciphers and Game Theory.

ETHIC OF EXCELLENCE AWARDS EVENT

This term we celebrated our Ethic of Excellence Awards, recognising students from Years 7–11 for their commitment to hard work, resilience and consistently high standards across school life.

QPR COMMUNITY

Our Year 8, 9 and 10 students have been working closely with the QPR Community Trust through the Premier League Inspires programme, taking part in weekly sessions designed to build confidence, teamwork, leadership and personal development. The programme has given students the opportunity to step outside of their normal classroom environment and develop key life skills through sport, mentoring and project-based learning. Across the weeks, students have shown real growth — not only in their engagement, but in how they communicate, collaborate and support one another.

As part of the project, students have:

- worked in teams to plan and develop ideas
- built presentation and communication skills
- explored problem-solving and leadership
- linked their learning to real-world challenges
- grown in confidence when speaking and sharing opinions

The sessions have encouraged students to take ownership of their ideas and challenge themselves, with many stepping into leadership roles and supporting their peers along the way.

Students will present their projects and ideas to judges, demonstrating everything they have learned throughout the programme.

The winning group will then go on to represent QPR at the Premier League Inspires Challenge Celebration Event, held at Everton Football Stadium, it's an incredible opportunity and a fantastic achievement for any young person involved.

ALUMNUS VISIT – MIA LEPPER

ALUMNUS VISIT – FAIZ GUL



We were delighted to welcome back former student Faiz Gul, who is currently studying Law at the University of Warwick. Faiz returned to speak with students about his journey into higher education and the world of competitive legal opportunities. Faiz has recently been awarded a prestigious scholarship from A&O Shearman, a global law firm that partners with Warwick to offer

high-value, funded opportunities for aspiring law students, including support through Law School LLM scholarships. He spoke candidly about the hard work and resilience required to reach this stage, sharing how he overcame disappointing mock exam results by refocusing, staying motivated, and seeking support.



A key theme of Faiz's message was the importance of networking and "saying yes" to opportunities, whether through workshops, outreach programmes, or enrichment activities, as these experiences can make a real difference when crafting a strong personal statement and preparing for university applications.

Students left the session inspired by Faiz's honesty, determination, and practical advice, and we are proud to see him thriving in his academic and professional journey.

SOVEREIGN MINDS SPEAR ORATORY COMPETITION – RUN BY OUR DRAYTON ALUMNI!

On Saturday 31 January, the school hosted the Sovereign Minds SPEAR Oratory Competition organised by three of our Alumni, Esher, Simrit and Harnoor Chagger, their family and a large number of volunteers. This continued a long standing relationship with the school as Esher, Simrit and Harnoor's father attended the school and their Grandfather gave over 30 years of service as part of the Science Faculty.

The Sovereign Minds SPEAR Oratory Prize is a prestigious speech making competition that gives 16 - 18 years olds which provides a platform and a voice to allow young people to set their sights on global issues whilst showcasing their own passion, intelligence and ability to find answers to the difficult challenges that young people face today. Students are invited to deliver a speech on one of the ten SPEAR target subjects. By choosing a topic they care deeply about, every entrant can deepen their understanding of global issues and develop a sense of responsibility as global citizens.

The topics students spoke on were, ending poverty, improving health, education for all, eliminating hunger, the future of work, protecting our planet, peace and justice, equality everywhere, global cooperation and

responsible consumption.

The competition was launched by Sovereign Minds, a UK-based educational initiative that works with young people to nurture their skills, mindfulness, curiosity, critical thinking and independence helping participants to succeed in both their careers and also their roles as responsible global citizens. Sovereign Minds are supported by over 120 volunteers ranging from teachers, lawyers, entrepreneurs, doctors, finance professionals and more with some volunteers coming from as far as Scotland to help run things at the school on the day. Everyone volunteering for Sovereign Minds is passionate about education and oracy and keen to ensure all students across the UK have access to opportunities.

More than 2,200 students signed up for the competition across London, with approximately 800 entrants from West London and 83 students from Drayton Manor High School taking part. There are four events in total, the Qualifiers, Quarter-Final, Semi-Final and Final.

The Qualifiers took place on 31 Jan across four London sites, with Drayton Manor being chosen to host the West London Qualifiers. The Quarter-Final will be take place 14 Feb at The Naval and Military Club in London, with the Semi-Final on 28 Feb at the House of Commons and the Final on 14 March at Church House, Westminster, with the overall winner receiving a £10,000 cash prize.

Four students from Drayton Manor have progressed onto the Quarter Finals, **Alex (12.1)**, **Adam (12.1)**, **Maya (12.1)**, **Elsa (12.3)**. The SPEAR Oratory Prize Competition was recently featured on the BBC where alumni Esher Chagger spoke live on-air about how her generation can be underestimated.

The Junior team have shown fantastic determination throughout their opening fixtures, securing two well-deserved victories alongside a single narrow defeat. Sitting in a strong position in the league table, the Juniors are well on their way to qualifying for the Ealing League semi-finals after half-term.



The Senior team has been nothing short of outstanding so far, achieving a perfect record of three wins from three, against Elthorne Park, Ada Lovelace and Ark Soane. With disciplined defending, creative play around the

As champions, the boys were invited to the exclusive Jr. NBA 3v3 Exhibition Game inside NBA House at Magazine London, the official fan zone for the NBA London Game. On January 16th, the team arrived in their Jr. NBA kit, ready to represent the school among NBA fans, partners, and VIPs. NBA House was an immersive basketball environment, packed with interactive stations, NBA partner activations, and a dedicated court used for showcase games. Against Beths Grammar School, the runners-up from the Jr. NBA 3x3 competition, our players delivered a confident and exciting 3v3 performance. Their teamwork, creativity, and composure showed exactly why they were crowned champions earlier in the season. Beyond the exhibition game, the boys enjoyed the full NBA experience — exploring fan activities, taking part in challenges, and soaking in the electric atmosphere. It was an unforgettable celebration of their hard work and success. Winning the Jr. NBA 3x3 Tournament also earned the team tickets to the NBA London Game 2026, hosted at the world-famous O2 Arena on Sunday 18 January 2026. This year's matchup brought two exciting NBA franchises to London: the Memphis Grizzlies and the Orlando Magic.



The boys had the incredible opportunity to watch global basketball stars compete live, including Two-time NBA all-star Ja Morant. The atmosphere inside The O2 was electric, with thousands of fans witnessing London's 19th NBA game and the league's 10th regular-season matchup in the UK. For our

students, experiencing the speed, physicality, and intensity of an NBA game up close was both inspiring and unforgettable. Alongside the game itself, the event was supported by a wide range of NBA initiatives, from youth clinics and community outreach to interactive fan engagements, creating a full weekend of basketball celebration that the boys were fortunate to be part of.

NETBALL

Training has resumed for students in Year 7 to 10 during lunch periods and after school with Ms Kear, and Coach Lisa from Evolution Netball. Students can develop their netball skills and have fun, all while demonstrating their ambition to represent the school in League matches and Borough tournaments. The Year 9 netball team, accompanied by Ms. Kear, took part in the Ealing Borough Tournament on Monday 12 January at Ellen Wilkinson School. They faced a challenging group stage, competing against teams from Twyford and William Perkin, Featherstone, and the host school, Ellen Wilkinson. Despite the tough competition, the team performed confidently, securing three wins and one draw. In early February, the Year 9s faced Greenford High School in an impressive display of skill and determination. With both an A team and a B team competing, the students delivered two strong performances. The A team dominated their match with an exceptional 33–1 victory, showcasing confident play and excellent teamwork. The B team followed with a well-earned 5–1 win, an especially noteworthy achievement considering that, for most of the players, it was their first ever netball match.

TRAMPOLINING



A team of students represented the school at the Borough Trampolining Competition on Friday 6 February, held at Ellen Wilkinson School. The event brought together competitors from Drayton Manor, Ellen Wilkinson, Cardinal Wiseman, Alec Reed Academy, Ealing Fields, and Featherstone, creating a vibrant and competitive atmosphere. Our students participated across a range of levels: Aeronwen Mercer competed in the intermediate category; Anastazja Sienkiewicz and Melissa Dedinca performed in the advanced category; and Fabia Wacha Mancebo represented the school in the novice category. For three of these students, the competition also served as valuable evidence for their GCSE PE practical examination, giving them the opportunity to demonstrate their skills and composure in a formal assessed setting.



PE SCHOLARS

This term the Year 8 PE scholars have been completing theory and practical sessions purely focussed on risk assessment and safeguarding. Notably, they have been learning about the differences between risks, hazards, likelihood, probability and severity. Students were challenged on creating lists of each aspect of risk assessment, comparing these to daily activities, such as navigating the school site versus sporting activities based in the gym or top playground. They have also performed practical sessions where they have each been challenged to identify, spot and list hazards in fixed and changing scenarios. They would recognise how to modify a task, applying control measures, such as highlighting a risk and introducing a new rule or law, to make the activity safe.

UNIVERSITY OF WEST LONDON: WOMEN IN STEM

Female students from Years 9 and 10 took part in Women in STEM sessions led by Professor Anastasia Sofroniou and Dr Nasim Dadashiserej. Students explored pathways in Mathematics, Computing and Artificial Intelligence, and heard about the speakers' personal journeys in STEM. The sessions gave students the chance to learn about real world applications, university courses and careers in these fields. The programme supports our aim to raise aspirations and increase female participation in STEM subjects.

YEAR 12 ASSEMBLY WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF LEICESTER



Year 12 students attended an assembly focused on the UCAS process. The University of Leicester team explained the application timeline, what universities look for and the importance of wider experiences such as volunteering, gap years and co-curricular activities. Students also received clear

guidance on writing a strong personal statement and asked questions about subject choices and university expectations.

ASSEMBLY WITH ST GEORGES' UNIVERSITY

Year 12 and Year 11 Gifted and Talented students attended a session on studying Law at university, led by a student ambassador. The talk covered course structure, key skills, typical entry requirements and the range of careers available to Law graduates. Students also learned about alternative pathways such as legal apprenticeships. The session helped students understand what studying Law involves and supported those considering future careers in the field.



YEAR 12 TALK – MARKETING



On 20 January, the Year 12 cohort and Year 13 Media Studies students attended an engaging and insightful guest lecture delivered by Georgia Henry, CEO and Founder of Pitch Marketing Agency.

Georgia spoke in depth about the rapid and exponential growth of the marketing industry driven by social media platforms, particularly TikTok and Instagram, and how this has transformed the way brands connect with audiences. Drawing on her own career experiences, she explained how she identified emerging digital trends early on and successfully capitalised on them to establish her own marketing company. Students gained valuable insight into her work with influencer clients, the rise of online

communities such as BookTok, and how these spaces have reshaped the publishing and marketing landscapes. Georgia also shared the inspiration behind creating the TikTok Book Awards, highlighting how innovative ideas within social media can lead to industry-wide impact.

The lecture provided students with a real-world perspective on digital marketing, entrepreneurship, and the importance of adaptability and creativity in a rapidly evolving industry.
